

Dress Code

Classroom

- Nametags:** Must be worn in class
- Shirt:** Must have collars and sleeves, covering underarms and torso completely. No inappropriate art, patches, or logos.
- Slacks:** Long pants in good repair – no shorts
- Shoes:** Shoes with socks are required
- Hats:** No baseball caps allowed
- Personal:** Good body hygiene must be maintained. Students must be clean-shaven or facial hair must be neat and trimmed. Proper undergarments must be worn. Tattoos or body art must be covered. Clothing with sexually explicit or suggestive graphics may not be worn. No display of midriffs or cleavage.

Hospital and Clinical Areas

When participating in hospital clinical rotations students are expected to be properly attired and neatly groomed. If students are not dressed appropriately, they will be asked to leave and the clinical rotation must be rescheduled. The proper attire consists of:

- Shirt/** White button down, with collar. Shirts must have sleeves covering underarms and torso completely. No agency uniforms, surgical scrubs, jackets: inappropriate art, patches, or logos.
- Slacks:** Dark blue, black, or dark brown – no denim jeans
- Shoes:** Sturdy shoes with socks – no sandals, open-toed shoes, clogs, canvas shoes, or cowboy boots
- Jewelry:** Watches and wedding rings are acceptable. Extremes in fashion and grooming, as well as elaborate and conspicuous jewelry, are to be avoided. Jewelry should be safe and unobtrusive. The only visible piercing allowed is a single post earring in each ear.
- Personal:** Good body hygiene must be maintained. Long hair must be worn (tied) away from the face, unnatural hair colors are not allowed. Students must be clean-shaven or facial hair must be neat and trimmed. Proper undergarments must be worn. No artificial nails or extenders are allowed in the clinical setting per HealthONE policy. Tattoos or body art must be covered.
- Name tags:** Must be worn at all times in the clinical areas. Name and picture must be clearly visible. Non-professional insignia such as pins or buttons are not allowed.
- Fragrances:** No perfumes or colognes. Excessive make-up and heavy perfumes/ colognes are inappropriate. Many patients, family members, and

employees are sensitive to these scents.

When the above standards are violated, the student may be asked to leave the clinical setting. In addition, the student will be verbally warned once and if unprofessional attire continues, the student may be terminated from the EMS program.
